Treasurer Report: (Dakota)

Balance 8/31 \$48,200.45. Still missing some invoices for services during fair so that number will go down. Total fair income \$40,560 with \$34,910 of that being gate tickets from rodeo weekend. That is up about \$5,000 from last year, so we definitely had more attendance. Dakota will prepare recap sheet and budget for next year for October meeting.

Manager Report: (Randy Mosby)

Clean up has been going great. Randy said fair set up and overall function was better this year. They are working on rebuilding the sawdust pile area. They had a complaint about rocks in the arena—they got a screen attachment for the skid steer so they can screen the dirt in the arena.

Extension Report: (Monica and Rebecca)

Still have one buyer that hasn't paid and had several that were 30 days overdue. Kids and parents are upset about not being paid for their sale animals because of that. Can we come up with a pamphlet (examples attached) to hand out at buyer dinner and sale of what being a buyer entails. And also put something similar in fair guide. Buyers are frustrated that they couldn't pay with a credit card—is this something Rachael can do even if buyers have to pay a processing fee?

Fair Review:

- Would really like to look at carnival rides for next year.
- Need digital signage on CR 120- Randy said road and bridge can do that for us
- Wash station- Dustin going to head this. The remaining monies from the Quin Lewis Fund will go towards this. Kail, Chelsea, Taylor is also on that committee. Going to start working with Randy to get this done.
- Need to add a speaker or two to the North Building so people towards back of building can hear during the shows. Also want a speaker in the beer tent.
- Can we choose food for buyer's dinner? Maybe more of a meat and potatoes kind of thing other than salad and beans...
- Need to add tent and panel rental to budget
- We need a campground host or just a singular person in charge of that- it was a mess
- Parking lot- need to make contestant side for rodeo weekend bigger
- Can we have more CCSO officer presence? Or park their truck with solid light on by the exit to deter drunk driving crap going on in parking lot? We had incident this year that threw rocks all over contestant horses and people. Could have hit a person or kid.

- Chelsea said her ice cream social and water balloon fight was huge hit. Wants to move more to just a huge water balloon fight at tractor area and get some extra funding and help with that.
- Royalty- Dakota and Sasha in talks about if they will stay with it, or advertise to get a new coordinator. Will have decision by October.
- Indoor projects went well, Chelsea enjoys it. Had some issues with a volunteer, Linda, who was very rude. Would like to try and fix that and make things better for next year.
- Bull fry cost us money this year instead of making any, so need to talk to commissioners about raising price per plate.

Everyone feels as though over all fair went very well this year, better organized than other years.

Buyer Options:

OPTION 1: Purchase an animal for your own consumption or for sharing with friends or employees. Note: Processing fees are extra

Fill out cutting instructions at the Scanga Meat Company table at the sale. If you want to have your meat processed elsewhere, you will need to make your own arrangements for transporting the animal and picking up the processed meat and make arrangements with the 4-H member if they are to take the animal home and feed them until the butcher date.

OPTION 2: Support and Promotion

If you do not want the meat from your animal, you can resell the animal at a floor price determined the day of the auction. You will pay the bid minus the floor price. The young person still receives the entire bid amount and you receive recognition and tax benefits from your purchase.

OPTION 3: Donation

Immediately after the auctioneer sells you the animal, you may "donate" the animal to an approved group such as the Grandstand Fund, 4-H Council, 4-H Foundation, etc. The 4-H member receives the full bid amount. The animal will resell at the end of the auction with the proceeds benefitting the group designated.

****Notify Auctioneer Immediately After Bidding that you are donating the animal to the specific group.****

Processing Fees

The Scanga Meat Company will process beef, pork, goat and lamb. Go to the Scanga table at the back of the auction to discuss how you would like your purchases processed.

Purchasing an Animal

- Choose from among the buying options listed in this brochure.
- If you wish to DONATE your animal, notify auctioneer immediately upon the final bid.
- Please pay Rocky Mountain Livestock Auction Clerks at the table at the back of the auction arena. Payment is expected at the time of sale.
- If you can't attend, but would like to bid on an animal, you can fill in the Proxy Authorization to Purchase form

and the Junior Livestock committee will place your bid.

- If you want your animal processed in a different location than Scanga Meat Company please indicate this when you pay for your purchase. You will need to make your own arrangements with the processor and with the 4-H member if they are taking the animal home until the butcher date.

Butchering 101:

When you have an animal butchered, the processor will slaughter the animal then hang the carcass (with hide and internal organs removed). This is called the hanging weight. The carcass is then cut up into steaks, roasts, ground meat, etc. Some of it is de-boned.

The processor charges a fee to slaughter the animal. They also charge a fee to cut up and freeze the carcass (the cut and wrap or processing fee.) This fee is calculated by multiplying the amount charged (for example beef is \$0.90) times the hanging weight.

When you pick up your meat the total weight (net weight) will be less than the hanging weight because of natural dehydration during the aging process and the loss of bone and fat from cutting.

Example: A steer weighing 1000 pounds will have an average hanging weight of 580 pounds. Then the steer will have a net weight of approximately 380 to 400 pounds depending on breed, how it is cut, how much bone is cut out and how much fat the animal was carrying.

First and foremost on behalf of the Eagle County Jr Livestock Auction Committee, we extend our sincerest thanks for supporting Eagle County 4-H youth. 96% of the earnings go directly to the 4-H member to repay the feed cost, labor and housing for their project. We pay for the sale with a 4.5% (TBD) commission, paired with our generous sponsors, as well as, all labor completed with volunteers.

Animals can be donated back to the Livestock Committee and placed under consignment, at fair market value.

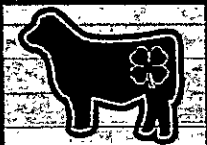

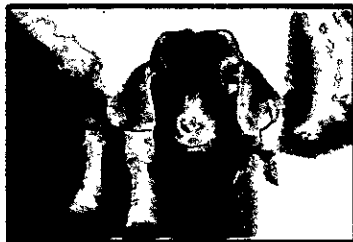

Chaffee County Junior Market Livestock Sale Information



What is the Jr. Livestock Market Sale?

This event is the accumulation of the hard work and dedication that each 4-H youth practice during their livestock projects. These young 4-Hers follow all regulations for health, nutrition, care and animal maintenance to produce quality meat that is presented at the market sale.

This sale is a live auction where 4-H youth present their livestock project(s) to potential buyers. Buyers bid and buy these animals in support of the youth.

Each year, the support and commitment from community members and local businesses allows these 4-H youth to participate in livestock projects in the future and save money for their future endeavors.

Our goal is to continue to grow the awareness and participation in agriculture within our youth. Without the support from our buyers this would not be possible. We greatly appreciate all supporters of the Jr. Livestock Sale and their dedication to 4-H youth!



The Bidding Process

- Register for your bidder number when you arrive. You will receive a catalog showing the sale order, animal weights and owners.
- When each animal is led into the ring, the auctioneer will suggest a bid in dollars per head.
- Signal your bid. Whether you purchase the animal or not, your bidding shows support of the 4-H youth.
- The highest bidder purchases the animal.
- Let the ring man know whether you want to offer the animal as a buy back.
- The 4-H youth will come introduce themselves and hand you a Buyers Thank You Card.
- Proceed to the sale clerk to make payment.

Where Does the Money Go?

The sale amount for each animal goes to the 4-Her who owns the animal. This money can sometimes be used for future investment in 4-H projects, savings, or even college funds. We thank all buyers for their financial support which allows these youth to continue their livestock projects and/or careers in the future.

What is sold?

Market swine, beef, lamb, goat, chicken, turkey, and rabbit are all sold at the Chaffee County Livestock Sale. Each animal is a 4-H project that the kids have been caring for throughout the year up until the sale.



Who Can Bid?

Anyone who has an interest in supporting 4-H youth and the development of agriculture within younger generations are welcomed to bid! You can bid to represent your business, support and/or partner with another business to buy an animal in support of 4-H youth.

I Won! What Happens Next?

If you were the highest bidder, you have two options to manage your purchase:

1. **Buy Back:** This option is best if you want to donate towards the purchase of an animal without having to deal with a meat processing plant. You do not receive the animal, but the proceeds go back to the 4-H youth. You pay the difference between the purchase price and the floor price.
2. **Custom Processing:** This option lets you put meat directly into your freezer. You pay the amount of your successful bid, plus processing fees. After the Fair, the 4-H member is responsible for transporting the animal to the processing plant. You can also make private arrangements with the 4-Her.
